### “Thanks for Your Patience”

I want to thank all of our patrons for their patience with the problems encountered with the new operating system that runs the online catalog, checkouts, reserves, et cetera. The regional online system (ANSER) is operated by the Ramapo Catskill Library System, and is used by the 47 member public libraries in Orange, Rockland, Sullivan, and southern Ulster Counties. This system is distinct from the online Internet service that Middletown Thrall Library uses for its website, [www.thrall.org](http://www.thrall.org), and for all of our public Internet terminals. Our Internet service, provided free as a public service by Warwick Valley Telephone Company, has been operating without any problems. Our staff controls our website, but do not have any direct connection with the ANSER operations. In mid-August, a new operating system – from the same vendor that RCLS had been using for many years – was installed. Despite the best, and constant, efforts of the RCLS technical staff, the new system has been plagued with problems since it went “live.” The vendor is working with RCLS to try and fix the many problems. Our staff, like you, has been dealing with the same difficulties in using the new system – including a number of behind the scenes problems that impact our operations. We hope that the problems will be solved fairly soon, or that some other options will be explored by the Ramapo Catskill Library System.

### “Wireless Internet is on the Way!”

Thrall is in the process of having wireless Internet installed in Middletown Thrall Library. Once it is operational, anyone with a laptop that has wireless capabilities, will have full Internet access anywhere within the building. There will be no charge for this service. Additionally, there will be a monthly savings in the library district’s budget since we will be able to drop several modem telephone lines that are being used to provide Internet access to library staff computers.
